HELPING LOCAL PEOPLE IN CRISIS

How foodbanks work

Providing emergency food to people in crisis. Every day people in the UK go hungry for reasons ranging from redundancy to receiving an unexpected bill on a low income. A simple box of food makes a big difference, with foodbanks helping prevent crime, housing loss, family breakdown and mental health problems.

Schools, churches, businesses and individuals donate non-perishable, in-date food to a foodbank. Large collections often take place as part of Harvest Festival celebrations and food is also collected at supermarkets.

Volunteers sort food to check that it's in date and pack it into boxes ready to be given to people in need. Over 40,000 people give up their time to volunteer at foodbanks.

Foodbanks partner with a wide range of care professionals such as doctors, health visitors, social workers and police to identify people in crisis and issue them with a foodbank youther.

Foodbank clients bring their voucher to a foodbank centre where it can be redeemed for seven days' emergency food. Volunteers meet clients over a warm drink or free hot meal and are able to signpost people to agencies able to solve the longer-term problem.

Food items urgently needed

Dried powdered milk; cleaning products, razors male and female, baby food age 10 months, long life juice.

Low on stock

Tinned carrots or peas, tinned rice, UHT full fat milk, non-biological washing powder/pods, toothpaste.

Aldermaston and Wasing: The Rectory, Wasing Lane and 19 Swan Drive, The Wharf.

Beenham: Under community noticeboard.

Brimpton: Inside the porch at St Peter's Church and Georgina Hairdressers.

Woolhampton: Inside the porch at St Peter's Church.

Defibrillators

In previous issues we have provided information about the location of the defibrillators across our local area. As the equipment is sometimes out of action for maintenance and the list changes as new ones are added to the network, we will not list them here, but you can check out the location of our local ones through this website: https://www.defibfinder.uk/

Of course, you may not be close to home when a situation develops. So rather than wasting time wondering if there is a defibrillator nearby, the most important thing to do is to dial 999 if you come across someone who is unresponsive and start CPR. If you are on your own, do not stop performing CPR to go and get a defibrillator. If possible, get someone else to continue with the 999 call while you carry on with CPR. When you call 999, the operator will tell you if there is a public access defibrillator nearby, what the location is and at that point you will be given the access code to the cabinet.

You do not need training to use a defibrillator. Although the machines can vary, they all function in broadly the same way. Once you turn the defibrillator on, it will tell you what to do. The device gives clear, spoken instructions and will not deliver a shock unless it is needed. Early CPR and defibrillation can double a person's chances of surviving an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest. Every defibrillator has a named 'Guardian' who is responsible for checking the equipment on a regular basis to ensure that it is ready to be used; this person then updates the central system, The Circuit, so that the 999 operators can give out accurate information in the event of an emergency.

NATURE NOTES

I am very thankful that we have had a few sharp frosts and hope we have some more before the real spring weather arrives. Flowers have been blooming out of season and are then shocked by frosts. Most of them will survive as our native plants are pretty hardy. When you think that in some regions, plants survive a daily change of temperature of more than 30 degrees centigrade, ours have quite an easy time.

Our usual local bird population seems to be flourishing, but I have not seen or heard of any winter exotics this year. Wild birds are not immune to diseases though and it seems blackbirds are the latest to suffer, from a mosquito-borne virus. Presumably we have more mosquitos because of a warming climate. We all have to accept the advantages and disadvantages.

Aldermaston & Wasing Show AGM - Chairman's Report - Summary

Firstly, our thanks go once again to The Old Mill for allowing us to hold the Show in their grounds and for hosting us so well. We never take this for granted and appreciate the close cooperation between us. We also thank the Show sponsors which have stepped up to provide more support in a very difficult economic environment.

We had a new committee for 2024, but none of the Show would be possible without the years and decades of work done by previous Show Committee members and helpers, several of whom have stepped down this year. I'd like to extend our thanks and appreciation for the continued help and support so willingly given by former committee members in this year of transition.

2024 was the year that the Show was rejuvenated by the introduction of local, committed and enthusiastic people to make up an almost new committee. Think back a year, to last January, from a standing start, they got to grips with the practicalities of putting the 2024 Show on. That was a tremendous achievement. To succeed in this whilst modernising, improving and reinventing our tired, old-fashioned systems which have been in place for perhaps too long, has been amazing. Doing all this, whilst maintaining the many traditional aspects, attractions, and events which people love and come to see every year was wonderful to see.

The traditional Committee roles and responsibilities have been shared to make them easier and more manageable. This has required close co-operation between Committee members and the trust to get things done. For that they should be congratulated. It has been a steep learning curve for all, but it will get easier going forward. New members are always welcome.

Over the past year, with new optimism in the future, the Show also has invested in that future. We have completely rebuilt our website to give it a more modern look and better functionality. New online processes make it easier for competition and marquee crafters to enter, and for us to deal with those entries. The advice and assistance from our Webmaster, Tony Girling, working so well with us has been invaluable, even into his retirement.

In response to an increasingly cashless society, we have introduced more opportunities to make contactless payment. One of the main income generators has been the Duck Derby. After over 30 years with no increase in prizes or ticket prices, our new committee agreed to take a bold step and increase both with much larger cash prizes on offer. Successful sponsorship made this a win-win for the Show and for the charities we support.

One thing out of our control as ever, was the weather. An indifferent forecast for Show Day turned to glorious warm sunshine! One of the best weekends in an otherwise soggy summer! This undoubtedly helped bring more people in and made the Show even more successful. I would like to reiterate that this Show of ours is a community event and it can only thrive with the active support of the local community. This year's Show will take place on Sunday 7th September at 1.30pm.

Aldermaston Parish Council- 14th January 2025

First of all, some good news! We have been successful in our efforts to find a successor to Revd Jane Manley. Two strong candidates presented themselves at the start of our meeting and we eventually selected Ed Tilsley of Maida's Way, as our new Parish Councillor. Ed, who I am sure many of you know, has lived in the village for several years, and is currently the editor of the Parish Council newsletter, so he knows, to a certain extent, what he is letting himself in for! As I have already said, the other candidate was equally strong, and we are sure his opportunity will occur before too long. In the meantime, we thank all for the interest shown.

In open forum we were faced with a delegation who wanted to know APC's position on the appeal by Easy Concrete at The Woodyard, Paice's Hill. Our chairman explained that it was on the agenda for discussion at tonight's meeting, but she felt that it was not one of the reasons for rejection last year but simply a resubmission of their case. She therefore anticipated that the APC response would be very much as before with the added proviso of normalisation. This turned out to be the case.

On the planning front we reviewed a further three applications. We agreed to return no objection to both the applications for the provision of bifold doors at the Old Mill, Station Road (al listed building) and a retrospective building at Sascron, Paice's Hill, though we will make reference to the flooding issues at the A340 on the latter site. Consistent with our policy of objecting to all developments that will lead to an increase in HGV movements through the village, we will object, however, to the retrospective application to regularise the provision of a scaffold storage facility at Young's Industrial Estate on Paice's Hill.

Since our last meeting, there has been just one planning decision by WBC. Disappointingly they have rejected the plan to merge the two remaining Dixon Cottages into one. (APC didn't object as the street view is unaltered)

The 2025/26 budget was discussed and our previous decision to keep our precept unaltered at £13.5k was confirmed. This is lower than many other Parish Councils of equivalent size, and we will continue our efforts to ensure you get good value for your money.

We now have evidence that the traffic is speeding outside Hilliers Garden Centre and have concerns regarding the safety of pedestrians using the crossing there. We have reflected these concerns to WBC. The Speed Indicator Device (SID) used has developed flat batteries and we are talking to both Brimpton and Beenham PCs regarding sharing the cost of replacing them.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 11th February 2025 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!

Councillors

Dates for 2025 PC meetings were agreed - mostly first Monday in the month.

Clay Lane flooding. No progress from WBC as yet.

Affordable Housing Project; next steps are to contact WBC for discussions and progression.

Discussion was held regarding the recent sale of two SNG (formerly Sovereign) properties in Beenham. The PC to seek clarification on their policy of property disposal and ask if they could be informed if properties become available in the future.

New Bus service. No update.

Proposed 20mph speed limit. Waiting for update.

Councillors responsibilities. Dieter Hinke has resigned so some responsibilities were reallocated until the vacancy is filled. Peter McEwen - Four Parish SID, Footpaths and Roads, David Hancock - Police liaison and Peter Hamblin - Victory Hall liaison.

Brimpton Parish Council

In the Open Forum of our December meeting, the churchwardens of St Peter's spoke about a problem that has been identified with the church spire. Wooden shingles have been dropping off and a recent inspection revealed that many of the shingles on the spire are at the end of their life. In January we granted the Parochial Church Council £6,000 towards a specialist assessment of the problem.

In December we noted that tankers contracted by Thames Water were being used to remove excess water from the sewerage pumping station in Brimpton Road. We were concerned the tankers were parking in a dangerous way on the bend and also breaking up the verge, as happened last winter. In addition, they have started parking in other lay-bys in the parish so we agreed to raise a complaint with Thames Water. Although we recognised in the short term the work has to be done, the tankers need better management and as this happens every year, we wanted to hear the long-term plan to resolve the issue. As we had not had even an acknowledgement from Thames Water, in January we supported the following motion proposed by Charles Brims:

Brimpton Parish Council resolves not to support any proposals for new houses that would use the sewerage plant in Brimpton Road until the current problems are resolved. The current sewerage plant is already unable to cope with existing demand whenever there is heavy rain, as has happened frequently in recent months and years. Thames Water's present solution is to have a fleet of tankers emptying the sewerage plant 24/7 causing much disruption to the village, road safety concerns and damage to the verges. This situation is already unsustainable and must be solved before any additional houses are added to this inadequate sewerage plant

We are also raising the issue with the Environment Portfolio holder at West Berkshire Council and I have also contacted Olivia Bailey. MP for Reading West and Mid Berkshire.

In December we agreed our budget for 2025/26. After four years of not adding anything to your Council Tax, our reserves have been reduced to a point where we felt we had no alternative but to levy a precept. which will add an average of £38.15 to the Council Tax paid by a Band D household. This is about 73.3 pence per week.

After more flooding, West Berkshire Council confirmed that whilst cleaned out in August 2024, the flow in the gullies by Abel Bridge is not adequate as they are silting up very quickly. Further work is expected but we have not been given a date.

WBC previously rejected a request to install cats eyes in Brimpton Lane, from the approach to Able Bridge leading up to the Back Lane junction. A resident has provided us with more information about current highways requirements which we will use to ask WBC to reconsider their decision.

The Parish Council will meet again on Tuesday 4th February, starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. You can receive Parish Council news and more about local events if you receive by email the fortnightly Parish Update. If you would like to do so, please let me know at john.russet@sky.com.

The Angel, George Frankum, Arthur Bason and a 'Dug- out' Supper



George Frankum and Arthur Bason were both former landlords of the 'Angel' inn, although separated by 150 years. George, born 1763, spent his childhood at the 'Rising Sun', Woolhampton, where his mother, Sarah, was the inn keeper. He became landlord of the' Lower Angel' in 1794 (the 'Upper Angel' was later the 'Falmouth Arms'). At this time the Bath Road, having been turnpiked in 1728, became the very busy stagecoach route from London to the West Country and the two 'Angels' and the 'Rising Sun' became busy staging inns. When Mr Stevens of the Aldermaston brewery raised the rent, George left the inn and busied himself with farming and other matters. During these years he bought land and built property, including a family home, now the 'Old Bakery' adjacent to this 'Bow Cottage' as a bakery. He also built the 'Mill', present 'Bottle Cottage' in Brimpton Road, 'Crescent' row of 6 cottages (demolished 1936) close to present 'Water Mill Court' and in 1815, the year of Waterloo, a cottage, later becoming the 'William IV' beer house and now housing the 'Rowbarge' inn.

Arthur Bason became landlord of the 'Angel' in 1925 and was in post in 1931 when the inn was demolished. The village was at this time experiencing the great increase in motor traffic including unskilled drivers (no driving test until 1935), motor cyclists without helmets, charabancs (day trip to Southsea 5s 6d), steam wagons, numerous cyclists and many accidents. Arthur operated a charabanc service from the 'Angel' known locally as the 'Scarlet Runner'. He was a carrier for the GWR with much end of term traffic for Douai school and was a member of the parish council. He was chairman and founder of the local branch of the British Legion. A feature of which was the celebration of a 'Dug-Out Supper'. For this occasion the club room of the 'Angel' was transformed to give the appearance of a 1914-18 'dug-out' with dirt and mud splashed on the walls and roof. Members were issued with rations of bread and 'bully' before entering the dug- out via a dark passage lined with duckboards. Just two candles were issued and they ate in semi-darkness while singing war songs. The end of the meal was marked by the throwing of a stink bomb.

The increase in traffic demanded change. Berkshire County Council began a programme of road widening and in 1931 the transformation of the village began. In 1936 Old Etonian Gerald Pixley became the landlord of the 'new' Angel.

For new residents in the village, or indeed anyone who fancies having a go, this involves buying 3 seed potatoes from a member of Show Committee, planting them in a largeish) container, tub, pot, etc., then bringing that container, intact, to the Village Hall on date of the Show in August Please note that only potatoes purchased this way are eligible, and also please remember that you have to get the container to Village Hall (planting them in a skip won't work!).

At the Hall, your container is tipped out, the potatoes weighed, and the highest yield wins and everyone keeps their potatoes.

Potatoes will be ready in March so if you are interested, please contact Terry (email terry.vallis@outlook.com soon. In light of last year's high number of entries, early response is required in order that you will not be disappointed.

b) Tallest sunflower



This year you can again select your own species to grow.

The tallest sunflower, anticipated to be between 9 and 15 feet (approx. 3-5 metres), will be adjudged the winner. 

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
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
