ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

This term, our value for Collective Worships is 'Courage' and we are exploring what this means, through bible stories, current events and wider school life. In every class, children are trying to follow the example of our Thinker Learning Hero who solves problems by using a creative and imaginative approach.

The theme of anti-bullying week is 'Choose Respect'. It focuses on the power we all have as individuals (children and adults) to make positive choices to help others and prevent, address and resolve bullying situations through respectful and kind behaviour. A key theme is children asking the adults in their lives to lead by example, both online and offline. As always, we are committed to taking part in this annual event. It allows us to revisit our school definition of bullying and ensure children know how to get help if they witness or are subject to bullying behaviour. Our approach to bullying is linked to our expectations that everyone in the school should feel safe, happy and able to learn. Bullying is a type of anti-social behaviour which is repetitive, intentional and involves an imbalance of power. We want every child to be able to tell a trusted adult if they come across this type of behaviour. The School Council has some work planned around this topic. We will also be talking to all children about having courage to stop bullying in a whole school collective worship as well as finding out what learning they have completed in class to help keep everyone safe.

We marked Remembrance in school with a Collective Worship during which a minute's silence was held. On Armistice Day our Year 6 children visited the Lychgate at St. Mary's Church (Aldermaston's War Memorial) and laid a wreath from each class, made in school, to mark the 11am silence and pay their respects. The names of the Fallen were read out. Poppies and other merchandise have been available in school for the children and adults to buy and a good amount has been raised for the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal.

The PTA's disco was a great success, and we also enjoyed the Fireworks event, where we joined with other local schools, led by Woolhampton Primary School's PTA.

Aldermaston Parish Council –12th November 2024

There were several representations in Open Forum.

The meeting began with an update on the Manor House situation by Cllr Revd Jane Manley. As you are probably aware, Praxis have recently closed our access following a serious Security issue. Jane has reestablished the car parking access for the Church, but Praxis are holding firm on their ban of access on foot. We are well aware of the 20 years rule (whereby we don't qualify for Right of Way access by virtue of Praxis using a Grant of Access) but nevertheless the Parish Council will write asking for access to be restored to Villagers.

Perhaps because of this, Jane mentioned her intention to resign from the Parish Council quoting pressure of work. The chairman thanked Jane for her wise counsel during the 5 years she was in office and announced the vacancy would be posted on the Noticeboards, so if you wish to join this worthwhile organisation you know what to do!

Our support was requested by the lease-holders of the 4x4 site on Paice's Hill, who were trying to evict a tenant (the lease had several years to run). Later in the meeting we decided not to offer our support, as we didn't want to get involved in such disputes, and neither party was offering our preferred solution, which was to restore the woodland to its original purpose (ie the home of ancient trees)

We were joined by a representative of Sascron, who explained their reasons why they had to build their unauthorised building, and hoped that APC would look favourably at their retrospective planning application. Although he had great admiration for the police, he was disappointed at their apparent unwillingness to visit the site, which he put down to lack of resources. Several members of APC reminded him of the importance of reporting of <u>all</u> incidents to the police, so that they recognise their problem areas.

Lastly in Open Forum we were faced with a proposal to reduce the speed limit on local roads from 30mph to 20mph. We doubted whether this could be applied to the A.340, though WBC claimed there was majority support from local residents for the initiative We will step up our speed camera work to find out whether motorists observe the current speed limits

On planning, we agreed not to Object to i) a replacement dwelling at Strawberry Farm, Burghfield Road and ii) demolition work at AWE. We will, however, Object to a significant development of apartments at Silchester Road, Tadley on the grounds of DEPZ. In the last month, WBC have Approved improved facilities at Falcon Garage, but have Refused additional caravans at Four Acre Farm.

We agreed a £500 library contribution. Any thoughts on how to spend our £50k CIL money?

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 10th December at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!

Beenham Primary School

It is hard to believe that the autumn term has nearly drawn to its conclusion. Since September, life at Beenham Primary School has been action-packed and it has been incredible to see how well the school has settled back into routine. From the start of the school year, we have worked hard as a staff team to secure our *Beenham Way* of being kind, safe and proud in everything that we do. The autumn term has particularly focussed on kindness and we have enjoyed putting our words into actions by building bird, bug and mouse houses for the local environment, inviting the community to a 'Kindness Tea Party' and sharing what makes everyone special during our 'positive noticing day'.

In the classrooms, the children have enjoyed studying their topics of *Me and My Community*, *Through the Ages* and *Dynamic Dynasties*. These engaging topics have encouraged the children and staff to get creative and develop new knowledge and skills. In Tala Class, our lovely new phonics scheme has meant that the children are all making progress with their reading and writing and they are embedding a love of learning in their play-based 'Busy Room'.

Beyond the classroom, the children have participated in many other learning experiences. We have been very happy to re-introduce swimming lessons at Bradfield College for Torak and Tundra Classes, and Tala are looking forward to their sessions in the summer term. In November, we welcomed Small Fire, Big Adventure back to our school to deliver bushcraft sessions for all the children. As well as this, the teaching team participated in an outdoor learning training session from Learning Through Landscapes, with the plan to include curriculum-based, purposeful outdoor learning at least twice a term for every class from January.

Looking ahead, we are excited to perform our Christmas production, *The Fleece Force*, on Wednesday 11th December. The run up to Christmas is always a magical time in primary school and we have lots to look forward to over the coming weeks.

We are still welcoming visits to our school for families looking for places for their children for September 2025 – please do contact the school office to book a tour before the application deadline on 15th January.

We hope you all have a very merry Christmas, and a peaceful and happy new year!

Notes from Beenham Parish Council Meeting: Monday November 4th

Stall holders for the Monthly Market will be asked to park in the school car park after unloading.

The footpath near The Strouds is in poor condition. WBC Streetcare to be contacted.

The Six Bells is under new management and it was important for the Community to support it. Land near Cod's Hill is used to store many commercial vehicles. PC to contact WBC Planning. Clay Lane, Bath Rd to Hall Place Farm is flooded and impassable on foot.PC to contact WBC Footpaths.

Councillors

About 50 people attended Affordable Housing parishioner meeting following the recent survey. Results illustrate a definite need. Points raised were the insecure rental housing, limited opportunities to downsize and the School needing to attract more children. Maps of Beenham were annotated by attendees with preferred, potential sites. After full analysis of these preferences, the PC may begin to approach the landowners of those sites.

Parking on the pavements around Back Lane and Mallard Way, Aldermaston Wharf. PCSO will visit to see the extent of the problem that pedestrians are encountering.

The changes to the bus services were discussed - see separate article. District Councillor to take up issues with WBC.

A 20mph speed limit in the vicinity of the school was discussed. The PC would like to hear parishoiners' views. Comments may be sent to the PC Clerk on the email address below.

Planning Matters

- -24/02020/FUL: A4 Metal Recycling Grange Lane. Erection of replacement buildings and storage of skips. The PC objects and has drafted a full objection document to submit to WBC. District Counsellor to take up matter with WBC.
- -Reduced size Grundon Solar Farm: It remains within the AONB and there are concerns should it expand. The PC will not object but will express these concerns. District Counsellor to take to WBC.

Parish Council Assets

WiFi use by private hirers of the Community Room and School Hall was considered. Two sets of passwords to be established. One for PC the other for hirers with conditions of use.

Other Matters

Once per year WBC provides a budget of up to £5000 to District Councillors for capital projects that deliver the Council Strategy Priorities. This is known as the Member Bidding Process. It opened on November 1st and closes next Spring. Parishioners may submit their requests for

consideration by the District Councillor.Please submit these to the PC Clerk on the email address.

The White Park Steer who had become a mascot of Beenham was loved by so many parishioners. RIP Winston.

BUS SERVICES TO BEENHAM (AND OTHER VILLAGES)

The 41 and 44 bus services to Thatcham were abruptly suspended at the beginning of November. In their place is an on-demand service to Thatcham, together with a small number of timetabled services. The on-demand service (called Community Connect) is a pre-bookable, on-demand service that operates from 9am to 2.24pm, Monday to Friday. Full details can be found at www.westberks.gov.uk/communityconnect. Bookings can be made through an App on a smartphone, or by phoning 01635 519650 (10am to 2pm). I suggest you use the helpful phone line at first, as it does seem complicated until you get used to it.

The scheduled services for Beenham include one afternoon bus from Thatcham Monday – Friday, and a return service to Thatcham via Aldermaston and Brimpton on Thursday only. A useful addition is a mid-morning shopper service on Monday and Wednesday to Sainsburys Calcot, giving 1.5 hours at Calcot. The bus goes Thatcham – Brimpton – Aldermaston – Beenham – Bradfield- Theale – Calcot.

Don't forget the Friday Carebus service to Newbury. This picks up at Theale, Beenham, Stanford Dingley, Chapel Row and Upper Bucklebury between 9 and 10am, and returns at lunchtime. It can take you to West Berks Hospital, Newbury Parkway and Newbury Retail Park. Places must be booked on the Thursday before 6pm by phoning 0118 9304837.

We would like to wish all our families, staff, committee and friends in Beenham and the local villages a very happy festive season and a good start to 2025.



With the significant rainfall in October the ground has been just too wet to bring in heavy duty felling equipment. With the water table being so high at present, even with a few weeks of dryish weather, it looks unlikely that we will get the felling done this year.

However, there is always much to do in Greyfield Wood.

We have now completed the felling in Upper Withy Copse and you will see that the loading area is beginning to fill with extracted 2.5m lengths of logs, that will eventually be sold on in bulk, 25 tons of it!

You will also notice that we have, regretfully, had to close some permissive paths in the Withy Copse and lower stream area due to danger of falling trees; diseased with Ash dieback. We know this will affect the paths some of you walk, but it is for all of our safety....

By the time you read this, the Christmas tree will have been felled and erected in its usual position near the School and our thoughts will be on festive preparations.

The directors of Beenham Wood CIC would like to thank all volunteers and those of you who enjoy and support the wood and wish you a safe, peaceful and enjoyable Christmas and New Year.

Brimpton Parish Council

Roads

- The road sign at the crossroads of the B3051 and Brimpton Lane has been knocked over and damaged. We have reported this to West Berkshire Council.
- The litter along Brimpton Lane, where it is too dangerous for residents to collect, has been reported to West Berkshire Council. The wall surrounding the War Memorial has been damaged by a car reversing into it. We will arrange a repair.

Planning & Development

• We had no objection to an application from Rose Cottage, 18 Brimpton Common, The company operating the Kennetholme Quarry has asked for a variation to its existing planning permission. Concern was raised that the deadline for completion of the work is being extended for another year, we decided not to object.

Brimpton Common Planning Enforcement Issues

• The application on Plot E for a change to equestrian use has been refused. In advance of the Twin Paddocks Appeal Hearing, a Case Management Conference took place on 25th October. The Hearing will take place on 14th January.

Draft Waste Management Strategy Consultation

- West Berkshire Council is proposing to reduce the general waste (black bin) collection frequency to 3 weekly. We are concerned about overflowing rubbish bins and an increase in fly tipping and so agreed to object to this proposal.
- West Berkshire Council is also reviewing household waste containers. We are concerned that any change to household waste containers needs to consider that in rural areas it might not be easy to move containers from the home to the collection point. There will be an increase in the types of material that can be recycled to include foil, plastic film and cartons. WBC may also introduce a service to collect small electrical items for recycling. Because of central government policy the former is inevitable and we welcomed the latter.

Budget 2025/26

We discussed the draft budget for the next financial year. The main focus of the discussion was an offer of "additional services" that West Berkshire Council has suggested the Parish Council may like to purchase. Before reaching a final decision on whether we want to pay for additional gulley cleansing and ditch clearing, we will ask West Berkshire Council how often it currently cleans the gulleys at Able Bridge, which is the main trouble spot in the parish.

The Parish Council will meet again on **Tuesday 3rd December**, starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The agenda will include a presentation on the structural problems affecting the spire of St Peter's Church and the financial implications of repairing this iconic local landmark. Bonfire at Brimpton Baptist Church - 2nd November, 2024

When I was growing up, Bonfire Night was synonymous with homemade effigies ("Penny for the Guy") and slightly damp rockets and Catherine Wheels fizzing in a back garden. There would be sparklers and if you were really good and your name was short enough, you might just avoid burning your fingers before the final letter was spelled out in front of you. Towns would hold municipal displays where you could have your toes trampled and develop neck-ache from looking upwards at the colours flashing in the sky, but apart from being wowed in the short term by what I saw and heard, I never felt particularly enriched by the experience. Not once did I walk away having been given something to think about.

The first time this actually happened was recently and in Brimpton! Thanks to the good people of Brimpton Baptist Church and in particular, Deacons Natalio Ortiz and Robert Marsh, I now see Bonfire Night celebrations as a time to give thanks for many things, starting with the fact that the failure of the Gunpowder Plot meant the survival of King James I. As we know, he went on to commission the translation of the bible into English - a version which became the standard in the Church of England until the 20th Century. The King James Bible went on to inspire poets, artists and composer/musicians down the centuries, including Handel and Elgar. Without the failure of the Gunpowder Plot, we might not have Handel's 'Messiah' - what a thought.

The evening itself was wonderful. We were made to feel incredibly welcome and the love and care of the church family was evident in both word and deed. We were offered hot drinks by smiling teenagers and feasted on chilli con carne made for the congregation's annual chilli competition. Brimpton's own John Dolphin was on the judging panel which saw the top three chefs coming from three generations of the congregation: a grand-father winning first place, a mum winning second and a brother and sister of young but indeterminate age taking third. The food was great, the company was friendly, the fireworks were spectacular and the bonfire blazed the whole event was fabulous. Thank you, Brimpton Baptists for inviting the village to your bonfire - those of us who were able to attend, loved it and I for one found myself enriched.

BRIMPTON WI NEWS

In our programme November's entry succinctly stated "Newbury Soup Kitchen". Hidden behind these simple words, was the story of a mother and her family's concern for the homeless and destitute, living in our local town. In 2017, home-made hot soup was served from the boot of a car to those found sleeping rough.



It has now grown into a volunteer organisation using premises equipped for cooking and serving hot meals. Our Speaker Meryl Praill and her family have built up an organisation dedicated to helping those who have fallen on very hard times.

Today's organisation has grown following the realisation of the needs of the homeless. It no longer just serves food, but also acts as a catalyst towards helping people to help themselves to improve their lives. Isolation and homelessness can adversely affect mental health and physical wellbeing. Having the opportunity to be in contact with non-judgemental people to whom they can talk is a start. Offers of outreach services such as hair cutting (by a local hairdresser) vouchers issued for clothes washing at a local laundrette, and special opening times for free use of the showers at the Northcroft Centre help improve their self-worth.

When homeless, many 'normal' life opportunities can be denied because a fixed address and a bank account are required to undertake paid work, or to see a GP. The Soup Kitchen has helped obtain free Vet services via the Dogs' Trust.

They have contacts with major supermarkets, who donate frozen meats, fish, bakery products, fruit and vegetables. Donations of food with a longer shelf life are distributed to those who have the facilities to prepare their own meals. Fundraising efforts by local volunteers bring donations from across the community.

It was an inspirational talk with many moving stories recounted. The Soup Kitchen will be open Christmas morning and a major local restaurant will provide the meal.

Our next meeting will be on <u>Tuesday 10</u> December and will be our annual Christmas buffet for Members and their guests.
