# Committee's Comments

The nights are noticeably drawing in now and we are well into the "Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness". Despite the shortening days, changing leaf colour and move towards cooler weather, the Committee Members hope that the contents of the Villages' News will stay on your kitchen tables throughout October to bring a bit of light and warmth to you all.

Thinking of fruitfulness, it has been a funny year weather-wise. Predicted to be even hotter than last year thanks to an El Niño event in the Pacific, 2023 has – thankfully – not lived up to that projection, although September broke records with seven consecutive days at 30C or above. We aren't out of the woods going forwards though as there is a 66% chance that global temperatures will break that all–important 1.5C Global Warming Limit at least once before 2027.

I wonder how many gardeners have had the same experience as I have had this year, in that many crops were poor (raspberries, blackberries) or failed totally (red and white currants – totally stripped by the birds – and walnuts – by the squirrels) while others did fabulously (broad beans, French beans, peaches, mulberries and figs). My courgettes are struggling to produce, but that suits me as I'm not very fond of them. I grow them out of habit but am grateful to Helen Apsey who supplied some delicious marrow recipes in the September Issue of *Villages*' News. Around this time of year, my favourite recipe is "Courgette Surprise" – meaning that tonight I won't eat courgette in any form; boiled, grilled, stuffed, sautéed, spiralized or in a soup.

On that note, please remember that the Committee would welcome articles of interest to include in future issues. I could certainly do with some suggestions for using up French beans as my freezer is now full.

# **Aldermaston News**

## Aldermaston Parish Council – 12<sup>th</sup> September 2023

Our September meeting was well attended by the community. A representative from The Old Mill addressed a complaint about frequency and noise of fireworks. The Mill has hosted 77 wedding this year to date, of which 8 had a fireworks display. They are 2-4 minutes long, take place before 11pm and The Mill gives advance warning to the community via their FB page on the day. This is all in-line with regulations.

Wasing estate gave a debrief on their recent Medicine Festival. The event was attended by 4,000 ticket holders and was enjoyed by all, however severe congestion that resulted when too many cars arrived at the same time on the opening day did cause considerable inconvenience to locals. Event organisers expressed sincere apologies to anyone impacted and said they would be making a number of changes to next years' event to ensure that it wont happen again.

We heard from the owner of 22B The Street who has a planning application to rebuild the property's rear extension. We later discussed in Closed Forum and agreed No Objection. A resident raised concern at WBCs lack of Conservation Officers. This subject was also discussed later in Closed Forum; we agreed to write to WBC asking them to specify how they are addressing their statutory and corporate duties to conservation. And finally, a resident asked if there was any news about the Woodstock site following the refusal of Easy Concrete's planning application in May. Following recent inquires to WBC we know that a new planning application is imminent although the nature of the application is still unknown. WBC Enforcement is keeping an eye on developments on the site but does not appear inclined to issue any notices to require the owner to clean it up at this stage. We are worried that the mounds of earth on the field to the north might become unstable in the wetter winter months and could pose a danger to the nearby road users. We have already raised with WBC and will push for reassurance on the matter.

Our ward councillor Dominic Boeck told us about WBC's measures to halt spending including recruiting only for critical vacancies in 2023 and spending only on statutory services but was unable to say whether the areas of Enforcement and Conservation, which are currently under resourced, would be affected. We agreed to write to the Council to stress the importance of these functions to our Parish and Dominic agreed to support our position. Dominic also said that the possibility of moving to 3-weekly bin emptying was being considered as a cost cutting measure, but reassured that Conservative council members would strongly resist the proposal.

On financial matters, we were pleased to report that our external audit was completed without caveats. There will be more detail on all of the above in our next Parish Council newsletter which can be accessed via our website at <u>www.aldermaston.co.uk</u>

### **Aldermaston & Wasing Show**

This year's Aldermaston and Wasing Show was special, celebrating our 80th year, thinking back to the early 1940s in a time of war and the campaign to Dig for Victory! We were delighted with the success of the show, so much positive feedback and more than 2000 people enjoying the beautiful setting of the old Mill and the glorious warm and sunny weather. The car park was full and large crowds enjoyed the produce and craft tent, the many stalls and arena events.

There was lots to see and do for adults and children including coconut shy, plate smashing, archery and tombola. Local groups were well represented including the Aldermaston History Group, Craft Group, St Mary's Church, Masons, Aldermaston Players, 1st Aldermaston Scouts who organised our parking. Local charities supported our event including the popular Daisy's Dream charity.

The duck derby was record breaking with more than 1400 tickets sold, providing mad entertainment, watching ducks racing along the stream chased by our chairman Clive Vare, raising funds for our two charities West Berkshire Food Bank and St Michaels Hospice. The raffle was also very popular with some amazing prizes donated by local businesses and individuals.

The West Berkshire Rock Choir and Tadley Brass Band provided some lovely music, the dog show was popular, the children's races were energetic and the egg throwing was entertaining and at times messy.

In the marquee, there were around 350 individual entries by 56 adults and children. The best dressed pot proved successful with fun and stunning entries including Pot Noodle and Gunpowder Pot. The photographic competition was hard fought with some stunning wildlife and rainfall entries. The homecraft section was well supported with the Jenny Franklin Cup won by Nicola Franklin for the best Victoria Sponge and the best homecraft exhibit to homemade jam by Julia Price. The craft entries included knitting, painting, woodwork, limerick, felt flowers and hanging decorations. Clare Bruton won the craft cup for a beautiful copper wire and bead hanging butterfly. The fruit and vegetable competition was mixed, there were no entries for the onion trophy, but a great selection of cut flowers and a good selection of house plants and fruit. The star of the show was Hannah Perry who was awarded 8 cups including flower arranging as well as cut flowers and vegetables. The Banksian Medal was won by one of our youngest ever recipients Lyla Beall.

The ongoing success and continuity of the show is dependent on so many factors. We are fortunate to be provided with the venue of the Old Mill and the support of the Arlott Family. We rely heavily on volunteers, sponsors and local groups. A lot of combined effort goes into organising the show and ahead of next year we are losing some key members of our committee after decades of commitment. # **Beenham News**

# NOTES OF THE BEENHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - 4<sup>th</sup> SEPTEMBER 2023

Some councillors were unable to attend the meeting, so there was not a quorum (which means that no formal decisions could be made). We had a general discussion until the Chairman arrived and we could then make the necessary resolutions. This included confirming the co-option of Peter Hamblin and David Hancock to the council (as the correct procedure had not been followed at the previous meeting).

### PUBLIC FORUM

Some of the points raised during the Public Forum were:

- Could the PC fund some more regular clearing of the footpaths, as some paths were overgrown. Other parishioners said that they had reported problem areas to WBC, and they had been dealt with.
- A parishioner was awaiting a Freedom of Information response from WBC, which had been promised in August. Other people commented that they were waiting for a response from WBC.
- The safety barriers that have been erected on the sharp bend opposite the garage were discussed. The barriers do guard some dangerous holes in the surfacing, but they push cars further out into the road. This will be reported to WBC.

The Licensing Application for Awberry Farm was discussed. The PC response is given below.

A parishioner asked if the PC would support an application to nominate the Six Bells for placing on the register of Assets of Community Value. This would give the community six months to prepare an offer to buy the pub, if it was put up for sale. A parishioner said that the process had been started when the pub was up for sale a few years ago, but it was not completed. The PC said they would consider this at the next meeting, but asked for more details.

### PLANNING

The PC had no objection to applications from Grundon to replace a site security cabin, and an application for extensions at The Hollies, Webbs Lane.

The PC agreed to submit comments on the license application for Awberry Farm. This would focus on the noise nuisance, and protection of children from harm.

### **OTHER MATTERS**

- We have been contacted about possible events to mark the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-day next year. If anyone one is interested in organising an event then please contact the Clerk or BVE.
- It was noted that signs have been put up about speeding on Beenham Hill, and turning engines off outside the Victory Hall. The possibility of more signs at dangerous bends was discussed, but the official view is that fixed signs lose their impact after a few weeks. The feasibility of a 20mph zone is being discussed with WBC.
- The procurement of a clock to mark the Coronation is proceeding, with generous sponsorship from 2 local companies.
- The Da Capo Orchestra have decided to relocate to Beenham, as they needed more space. They will be meeting each Thursday in the School Hall. They welcome all adults, without audition. For more details see da-capo.org.uk.

### Kites

The first kite I can remember was diamond shaped: it had a single string and long tail. I would run up and down a Cornish beach trying to get it to fly, before putting it away for another year. Then in my early twenties the 2-stringed kites came in, and you could make them dance around the sky and amaze people who had never seen one before. In the right wind they flew really well – until they crashed into the ground and broke a spar.

Then somebody told us that Red Kites had been re-introduced into England, and could be seen on the hills around Henley. I had no idea that there were large birds called Kites that used to live in England, but I finally saw one in the distance, and was amazed by the size and grace of them. A few years later a few birds were spotted around Beenham, and the rest (as they say) is history. When they first arrived we would put meat out for them, but when we had 12 birds swooping down on the garden we decided it was getting a bit much (they would perch in the trees around and demand food). Even now, if I put a bit of old cat food on the lawn there will often be a kite swooping down within 10 minutes (do they smell it, or see it??).

Kites are now just part of the scenery in Beenham. Sometimes you will see one or two in the distance, but sometimes a large group is just circling straight overhead: it looks like they are doing it just for fun. There is no other large bird in UK that you can watch in flight in the same way. I did not realise just how big they are until I saw one close up.

There is no official collective noun for a group of red kites, but unofficial ones include a 'wake', a 'roost', a 'husk', a 'soar' or a 'kettle'. I think a soar of kites sounds right. We are very lucky in Beenham to have kites to gaze at.

# DO COME AND PLAY ORCHESTRA (Da Capo) COMES TO BEENHAM

The Da Capo Orchestra have chosen Beenham School Hall for their Thursday evening rehearsals.

Back in 1995, local musician Patsy Moore decided to start an amateur orchestra. Her intention was that this orchestra would be open to all adults, whether players who were returning to their instruments after years of neglect, or those who had newly taken it up. No auditions were required, and Patsy would provide simplified parts where necessary. Patsy initially ran this orchestra as an evening class under the auspices of Newbury College, and called it NCLSO (Newbury College Late Starters Orchestra), meeting for a couple of hours every Thursday evening at Denefield School, Tilehurst.

In 2003, when Patsy tired of the paperwork involved in running an adult education class, she made it an independent group, now called Da Capo (Do Come and Play Orchestra). We moved from Denefield to several locations, finally ending up for many years at Padworth Village Hall. Patsy conducted us, occasionally assisted by her husband Ken and her daughter Jennifer; Ken and Jennifer also composed pieces for the orchestra.

When Patsy passed away a few years ago, the orchestra decided to continue as a self-governing unit. We appointed a committee and interviewed prospective conductors. We chose Laura Stead, whose day job is a serving Army officer, conducting various military bands.

In recent years our numbers have been growing. When we realised that our numbers were likely to pass 50 in the coming term, it became clear that Padworth was too small to accommodate us comfortably and safely (walking around everyone's parked instruments is like picking your way through a minefield!). The committee decided to look for a new rehearsal venue. After considering some locations, we decided on Beenham School Hall. Not only does it offer the extra space we need, but it is pretty close to Padworth, so nobody gets to make an appreciably longer journey.

# **Brimpton News**

# **Brimpton Parish Council**

Among the items discussed at our September meeting were the following:

We were joined by Jenna Ansell, the Festival Director and by Andrew Perkins, the CEO of the Wasing Estate, to discuss local reactions to the recent Medicine Festival at Wasing Park. Although there was a brief flare up of noise on Friday evening this was dealt with fairly quickly and overall there were few noise or traffic issues in Brimpton or Brimpton Common.

A resident told us she had attended the festival and found it to be well organised with a peaceful atmosphere. Another resident reported that having a steward at the end of Wasing Road redirecting traffic was very effective.

Jenna Ansell reported that the traffic management company have suggested that there are two points of entry to the site next year to relieve the congestion experienced in Aldermaston. She also informed us that although amendments to their licence permit a higher number, they will not be increasing the number of attendees above 6000 next year. They will be increasing the amount of signage on the roads into the site and looking at the possibility of putting an official closure on Google Maps.

After this item we considered an application by Grundon Sand & Gravel Ltd to vary the timescale for the conclusion of work at Kennetholm Quarry. In order that Grundon complete work on the site, we agreed we had no objections but would express disappointment at the continued delay in completion.

We had no objections to an application to install solar panels at Arundell Lodge, Brimpton Lane .

The owner of 2 St Peters Close has applied to remove 4.2m of the existing front wall to create vehicular access to a new parking space. Some residents are opposed to this proposal but the wall is not protected and there is an earlier precedent at the adjacent Almshouses where part of the wall was removed to create an entrance some years ago. Because the wall is not protected we agreed not to comment on this application.

We are still waiting to hear from Wise Energy about replacing the dead trees and bushes around the Solar Farm.

Earlier this month we met with Thames Water by the sewage pumping site in Brimpton Road. Although they have no plans for improvements to the site to end winter flooding, Thames Water did offer to draw up an Action Plan to improve the verges and the gateway to the site. Nothing has yet been received.

It was agreed to delay the installation of the memorial stone to Queen Elizabeth II until Spring 2024 so that the unveiling event can be held in better weather.

Our next meeting will be held on **Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> October 2023** in the Village Hall, commencing at 7.30pm.

# Butterfly Conservation Upper Thames Branch Churchyard Survey

Once again it is time to report on my survey of the six churchyards within the Benefice of Aldermaston and Woolhampton. The aim is to survey each of the churchyards, once a month from May to August but my report is incomplete this year due to a very wet second half of July meaning that there was no point in carrying out a survey by the time I was able to do so.

One point to notice is that five of the Parish Churches now have designated areas for wildlife that have been left uncut to encourage butterflies, invertebrates, and small mammals. Pre-eminent in this effort has to be St Mary's Beenham where a large proportion of the churchyard and adjacent graveyard have been left unmown with paths being cut to allow access to graves. I am aware that this has caused some criticism locally, but I really commend this sympathetic management approach that has led to swathes of harebells establishing themselves in the churchyard. This is not neglect but care at the best level. Summarizing the title of Dr George McGavin's Eco Church lecture earlier this year in Brimpton, do we want our churchyards to be "God's Acre" or a "Barren Boneyard"?

The first two surveys were extremely depressing with no more than a handful of orange tips, small whites and large whites being spotted in all churchyards in May and just a few ringlets and meadow browns in June. The one highlight being a red admiral at Midgham in June – but more of that later.

July was – quite literally – a washout. I wasn't able to carry out the survey in the first two weeks and then the rains came and there was no point. However, I am sure we all noticed an upturn in flying butterflies after the first few bursts of rain before the heavens opened. Noticeably, there were good numbers of commas flying around and well above average numbers of red admirals. This even made the evening news and the BBC website, with Butterfly Conservation stating that these increased numbers are probably due to the red admiral being able to over-Winter in recent years due to the extended Autumns we are experiencing as a result of global warming.

August saw a big improvement in numbers, with small whites, green-veined whites and large whites predominant in most churchyards. In St Peter's Woolhampton I witnessed a courtship chase of six green-veined white males after a single female. Meadow browns and gatekeepers were seen in most churchyards and holly blues were spotted at Midgham, Woolhampton, and Beenham – the holly blue has had one of its good years but may decline next year as the parasitic wasp that preys on it grows in numbers and the natural cyclical fluctuation kicks in.

I had left the back half of my garden to run rank with nettles in the hope of attracting small tortoiseshell, peacock, red admiral and maybe comma to lay on the nettles, but nothing happened. Then, on the  $29^{th}$  July, I spotted a female red admiral on my gravel drive and now I have three caterpillar nests in a scrappy bunch of nettles at the front of my house. I like to think they came from her – the timing is about right. On the basis that a picture is worth a thousand words, I finish with photographs of that female red admiral and a comma taken in my garden.

### "Down on the Farm" in September

How things change. Since my last missive in July it seems like it has constantly been wet. Our winter barley wasn't combined until August, and even then we were frequently dodging showers. We have finally finished today, Sept 14<sup>th</sup>, after one of the most frustrating and poorly yielding, stop/start harvests that I can remember, and I have actively been involved with 50 harvests driving the combine harvester.

At least we finished just in time for the re-start of the "Newbury Show". I have been involved with this all my life and thoroughly enjoy working and stewarding the cattle section. The numbers are well down this year due to TB restrictions, financial constraints and some have retired with Covid being the catalyst. Hopefully there will be a nice representative of animals for everyone to see and enjoy. It will be interesting to see people's views on the show layout and organisation by the new management. Here's hoping for an enjoyable weekend meeting up with friends and experiencing Rural and countryside activities.

The good news with the wet summer is that our beef cattle have been enjoying lovely fresh grass and gaining weight, without having to feed expensive winter silage. Quite often with a hot dry summer, as last year, the grass completely stops growing and we must supplement that with hay and silage. We will be weighing the animals soon to see if they have reached the optimum weight for their final journey off the farm.

The saying goes "No peace for the wicked". How apt that is in the farming calendar. We now have about a month to turn all the fields from golden yellow stubbles into dark brown seedbeds, so that we can sow the seeds for next year's harvest, into warm and moist conditions before winter threatens. This will generally be oilseed rape, barley, and wheat. We have already sown stubble turnips after the harvested barley. This will produce valuable fresh feed for sheep over the winter and they in turn will leave manure behind as fertiliser for the next crop.

It is nearly time for our six-monthly TB test on our cattle. This is always a very worrying time as to whether the dreaded disease has infiltrated our herd or passed us by. The results will determine the fate or our herd, so fingers crossed for positive news.

Another issue on the horizon is I am due to have a replacement shoulder joint. Unfortunately, I suffer from severe osteo-arthritis and already possess two replacement hips and a replacement knee. So, the word 'Bionic' has been banded around. Personally, I blame my parents, as it is hereditary, and nothing to do with a misspent youth of sport and socialising.

By the time of my next musings, the clocks will have changed, no doubt the temperatures will be somewhat lower, the turkeys for sale signs will be up and lets hope the world will be a safer, happier place.

After that very hot spell that concluded such an unusual summer, autumn is suddenly very obviously here. As I write, leaves which were very green a week ago have turned yellow. The autumn colours will soon be with us. However, when you read this many fruits will still be on trees and bushes, so I would like to suggest a bird food store. Those of you with chest freezers will, with luck, have room for a tub of mixed fruit. There are still haws on the bushes, late blackberries and elderberries. A tin of these, with maybe windfall apples (chopped and worst bruises removed) maybe life-saving if we get a bad spell. A handful or two, thawed overnight and put out in the morning would be gratefully received. You may attract redwings and fieldfares, or at least pigeons!

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
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
