Beenham News

Notes for Beenham Parish Council meeting Mon August 5th PUBLIC FORUM

Long grass cutting on A4 junction and The Avenue was raised. Work has been done on the A4 but not yet on The Avenue. The PC had advised WBC that this was an urgent matter of safety. A formal complaint to WBC sent by a parishioner has had no reply. District Councillor D Boeck to follow up with WBC.

Councillors

The mobile library service is to be reduced from a 3 week cycle to 6 weeks. The PC contributes to the cost of this worthy service. It will send its concerns to WBC.

The fire curtain in the Community Room was discussed. It was agreed that this should be considered in the context of the overall fire risk analysis and replacement of the school fire doors.

Parking by the school was discussed.

It was agreed that guidelines would be published in the school newsletter as follows: no parking on the pavements; no idling of engines while parked; no parking down Church Lane.

The recent spate of vandalism was discussed. Repairs have been carried out by the PC. The Police are taking no further action due to lack of evidence of potential suspects. The WI bench by the school was also damaged and is being assessed for repair by the WI.

The Affordable Housing survey was discussed. It was agreed to proceed with the survey; to run between August 20th and September 20th. All households will receive this in the Villages' News and are encouraged to submit their views. It should be noted that this survey is not connected to the Governments plans for increased house building which are still in the development phase.

It was agreed to go ahead with the SIM card for Community Room wifi on a two year contract.

The proposed defibrillator for Aldermaston Wharf was discussed. It may need a licence from WBC Streetcare before installation.

Gladys Brook

Gladys Brook died on 15th June 2024, aged 96. In 1953 she and her husband Ted came to their dairy farm, along the A4. Considering equality and financial independence essential to a strong marriage and partnership, Gladys taught full-time in Newbury, and following a career break to raise her family, at Beenham Primary School, retiring as Deputy Head in 1992. She joined the Parish Council and became Chair and later Life President of Beenham Friendship Club.

We remember her with great affection as a brilliant, wise, caring and dedicated teacher, and memories from current and former villagers are summarised here:

She was a beautiful soul, always smiling, for many the best teacher they ever had, with a lovely heart. Whether you struggled or found things easier, she treated everyone the same. She was an outstanding, no-nonsense teacher, remembered with thanks for her rigour in Friday times-tables tests and as a kind, gentle, caring teacher but "a bit strict when needed!". Children were very fond of her and called her a legend and related so many of her farming tales! She always wanted the best for all her pupils, and arranged for 4 lads in the Young Farmers to have a lesson with Ted judging his dairy herd, before a competition.

Others recall her as an amazing character, a wonderful raconteur, an inspirational teacher and a great personality who made you feel she was championing you to be the best person you could be.

One former pupil, now a teacher herself, recalls loving her time in her class at Beenham School and often catches herself saying things that remind her of Gladys.

"I fell in love with the author Dick King Smith when she read us "The Queen's Nose", and think of her whenever I recommend one of his books to a child I'm teaching now. She talked with such love about Jane and Peter. I thought how cosy their farmhouse must have been and often wished I lived on a farm too! She'd say she would have people's guts for garters for certain misdemeanours – I wondered how that would work!"

A wonderful mother and nan, a friend to many, a respected teacher to pupils and parents alike, she has left an indelible mark on a generation of children and a legacy of kindness and strength.

A private cremation took place in July but there is a memorial service and celebration of her life at 12.30pm on Wednesday 4th September at St Mary's Church, Beenham. All who cherished her enthusiasm for life will be welcome, not in sombre clothes! Hello from Greyfield Wood! The last couple of months have been busy with various volunteer sessions keeping paths clear and getting rid of the ever-growing scourge of brambles and ferns. I say "scourge", as these plants can smother and choke the saplings that have been planted over recent years. As the objective is to replace any removed trees with new plantings, a lot of effort needs to go into ensuring their survival.

To this end, as you may have read in

the Beenham Facebook pages, we had a successful trial using a motorised Brush Cutter, which enabled us to cut all the main paths over a couple of days. A job that would usually take many weeks of effort by hand.

In other news, the Greyfield Wood CIC welcomed Andy Eccles to the board of directors. The directors, who have no shareholding, or financial interest in the company are legally responsible for the upkeep of the woodland and ensuring the wood is a safe place for the community to use.

The directors are: Ian Johnson, John Newton, Neil Jackson, Simon Chippendale, Andy Eccles and John Hammond. Any of us are happy to chat about the wood or answer any questions. Regarding the subject of "woodland safety" for the community, I expect to give information about some significant felling that will be happening later in the year, to ensure that all public rights of way and other paths through the wood remain safe.

In the meantime, please continue to enjoy our woodland.

Brimpton Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 6 August. A large part of the meeting focussed on the unauthorised occupation of a plot in Blacknest Lane field which is the subject of a planning appeal. Recently there has been some activity in the field where the owner of the plot which was the subject of a second application has cleared vegetation and cut back trees along the access route

The schedule for the Appeal Hearing for the first planning application has been published. A member of the Brimpton Common Residents' Group told us the group wished to take an active part in the Hearing and had applied for Rule 6 representation. They want to enhance West Berkshire District Council's defence of their planning decision and to ensure that residents views are heard. In the light of this we decided we would not apply for Rule 6 status as well, but would submit a written statement to the Appeal Hearing. This would make clear that the Parish Council supports the residents' group; reiterate the previous reasons for objection; and raise concern that the applicant has already gone ahead and moved onto the field without planning permission.

The residents' group has passed to us a paper setting out the potential costs for a barrister and expert witnesses to speak for them at the Appeal Hearing. These are estimated to be in the region of £80,000. The group is fundraising amongst residents of Brimpton Common and intend to make a formal request to the Parish Council to provide financial support at our September meeting.

Moving on to roads, we have reported to WBC concerns raised about stones and debris along Brimpton Road, near to Brimpton school, and about the overhanging bushes and trees on Crookham Common Road, near to the bend before the village. Residents are encouraged to report these problems to WBC as well because the number of complaints appears to affect the speed of response.

On behalf of the Recreation Ground Trustees, Charles Brims thanked everyone who provided feedback on the options for using the funds received from selling the old Recreation Ground. There was a strong preference for Option 1: to keep the funds (including rolled up interest) on deposit in case another piece of land can be found that is both suitable and available for acquisition.

On behalf of the Village Hall Management Committee, John Dolphin reported that a condition survey has been carried out which shows that the hall is structurally sound but some work will be needed over the next 10 years. It was estimated that the work would cost around £250,000. We had no objections to an application to vary a condition to a previously approved application to demolish a conservatory and single storey outbuildings at Brimpton House and to construct a single storey replacement rear extension. We noted approval has been given for a change of use of the former Three Horse Shoes pub to a family residence.

We agreed to donate to SSAFA the excess income of \pm 386.81 received from the D-Day commemorative events organised in June.

This is an abbreviated version of the account of the Parish Council meeting which appeared in the Parish Update and is distributed by email. Brimpton WI NEWS

Our July Meeting is always one where we meet at a venue outside the Village. This year it had been agreed that we would have an afternoon visit, to Whitchurch Silk Mill. Over 20 of us including some guests started with sandwiches and cake in the Mill, followed by a guided tour around the building and grounds. The Mill is an Industrial Heritage site, and is categorised as a Working Museum of National Importance. We learnt that originally it was built as a warehouse in the 17^{th} Century, then having had alterations made, including additional buildings added over the years, it only became a Silk Weaving Mill in the early 19^{th} century. By this time there were also houses for key workers and their families, some of which still exist but are not part of the Museum.

The Museum had recently been awarded at substantial grant for the costly refurbishment of the wheel itself, repair and conservation of the building, improvements to facilities etc. Part of the grant had also covered the costs of training and employing a graduate student specifically in silk weaving techniques etc. whose researches have included the weaving of Silk Ribbons so popular in Victorian times. Both these and the lovely woven silk scarfs are now made commercially to order. The former being particularly of interest to textile and fashion conservationists as most of the original ribbons are very fragile and rotting away with age. They can copy the designs and colours of the originals, enabling restoration of the correct ribbon styles for the costume concerned. Re-enactors and film and theatrical costume makers are also taking an interest. It was a fascinating visit, as the looms were working albeit powered by electricity, as although the wheel will continue to turn, it is many years since it was last connected to the bobbin winders, looms etc.

It was a fascinating visit, and the moving of this meeting to the afternoon rather than our usual evening get together, was also deemed to have been a success.

Our Next Meeting will be on <u>Tuesday 17</u> <u>September</u> when our Speaker will be local craftsman Jason Leggett on "Working with Glass". NATURE NOTES

My greens on the allotment are covered up (although a few holes have developed!) so I planted a few at home unprotected. The poor butterflies must have somewhere to lay their eggs! Sure enough they have been covered in caterpillars. The Brussels sprout plants have been stripped, but the sprouting broccoli was hardly eaten at all until the Brussels were finished. The remaining caterpillars have migrated to the less palatable greens – who would have thought they have preferences? The mature ones have gone off to pupate and prepare for next year. They won't all be butterflies because some will have been attacked by ichneumon flies. The larva of these live in caterpillars, being careful not to eat the vital organs until they are practically mature. The caterpillar then crawls somewhere to pupate, but dies, surrounded by little yellow fly-pupae. Someone once told me these were caterpillar eggs!

Browns, Bolts & Baskets



Tradition was broken in May 1872 when the men of the 'Woolhampton Benefit Society' as part of the normal Whitsuntide demonstration marched from the 'Angel' to St.Peter's without the usual accompaniment of a hired band. It was explained in the '*Reading Mercury'* that "unlike previous years could not afford a band as had not been favourable for rod growing and finances of the village had not been flourishing". This underlined the importance of rod or osier growing in the village.

The Brown family had established their rod growing and retailing business in Woolhampton during the 1840s when William Brown had moved to the village from Brimpton. William died in 1879 and his eldest son, George, became responsible for the enterprise. He was assisted by two of his sons, Victor and Archie, while Frank farmed at Shalford's, Brimpton and Tom at Hall Court Farm, Midgham. Archie left the rod business in the 1930s and ran a dairy business from 'Brook' Farm, Station Road. He became the first to introduce milk bottles to village customers. Victor assumed full responsibility for the rod growing business.

The main cultivated rod beds were to the east of the village. From here the rods were harvested for use in basket making. Baskets had a variety of uses - for laundry, fruit and vegetables, water cress, oyster pots, furniture, picnic hampers, postmen's baskets, frameworks for Guard's bearskins, bodies of early perambulators and bicycle baskets. In the First World War they were in demand for holding shells and field dressings.

After harvesting, the rods were stripped by female labour, imported from Tadley, in the 'yard' opposite the present service station on the Bath Road and tied into 'bolts' for transportation. A number were sent to customers in Holland and London from Midgham station. Ledger entry 1896/97 "order two trucks to come on Monday and two on Tuesday". The beds were the scene of frequent fires generated from steam trains on the adjacent railway lines. The business declined in the 1930s in part owing to the import of diseased Belgian rods

The recent housing development in the village 'Reed Gardens' overlooks the former rod beds now designated a Site of Scientific Interest. 'Victor Place' sited on the lower slopes of Woolhampton Hill is named after Victor Brown who was a member of Woolhampton Parish Council for 46 years and for 39 years the village representative on Newbury District Council.



Aldermaston Parish Council –13th August 2024

In open forum, we were lobbied by local residents who objected to plans for Four Acre Farm, Reading Road, which was on our agenda. In particular they were concerned about the protected woodland at the rear of the farm and lack of clarity on the planning application, which led to a question regarding how many caravans would eventually be on the site.

A Trustee of Aldermaston Charity attended to support, and answer any questions the Parish Council might have, on the planning application for the conversion of the two remaining single Dixon's Cottages into one.

Also in open forum, some people complained about lack of a conservation officer at West Berks, which has led to delays in the endorsement by West Berks of the report by the Conservation Area Appraisal (CAA) working group.

Abi Lewis attended as a member of the general public, and confirmed that she will take up the position of Parish Clerk on 2nd September. She signed her contract at the end of the meeting.

On the planning front, this month we had four applications, of which we agreed to oppose Four Acre Farm's application. We did not comment on the applications for Dixon's Cottages, tree surgery work at Juniper House, Fisherman's Lane, or the AWE. We didn't consider that the AWE application for demolition and clearance work required planning approval.

Since our last meeting, West Berks Planning Authority has granted approval for Burnt Pine, to which the Parish Council previously recorded no objection.

As regards highways, we are concerned about the number of HGVs using Church Road illegally and will continue to lobby West Berks on this issue. We are also concerned about the status of the stiles on footpath No. 9, which runs from Wasing Lane to beyond Paices Wood.

The results of the Kestrel Mead playground survey were reviewed and option 2 (basket, swing and trail), had the most support, with option 3 as a fallback. These results will now be shared with West Berks who will become the eventual owners of the equipment

As regards the absence of a Conservation Officer at West Berks, we agreed that we would delegate the task of following up this matter to the CAA working group, who are still awaiting a response from WBC to the appraisal, which West Berks requested.

We have received reports that the overhanging vegetation by St. Mary's Church is blocking the pavement. We will report this to Praxis.

We agreed to go with the Suffolk Payroll Service for the new clerk.

We noted that the Aldermaston & Wasing Show this year is on Sunday 1st September at the Old Mill.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 10th September at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!
