#### **Committee Comments**

Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> May, the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day, saw us congregated in the village hall for fish and chips, followed by the lighting of the beacon. Before that the King's representative paid a very moving tribute to mark the occasion.

But trust good old Thames Water to put a spanner in the works. For three days their contractor had had the local roads closed during the day to replace manhole covers. On the Thursday evening, with the work running over time, they decided — without either consultation or even prior notification — to close the road at the war memorial, thus cutting off the village from its village hall. And this was done while the celebrations were ongoing at the village hall. The block was a lorry pitched broadside across the road, preventing any access, thus cutting off the villagers' homeward route, and necessitating an 8-mile detour to travel home.

It was also the day that we had a new Pope, less than two weeks after his predecessor's death. Meanwhile it looks like it will be up to 18 months from Justin Welby's resignation before his successor is known. Our Parish Councils have a better track record of getting things done.

Enough whinging - enjoy the sunshine while it lasts!!

#### ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

The term started with the news that our Headteacher, Mrs Higgs, is leaving us after seven years at the school, to take up a strategic role in a neighbouring local authority, remaining in education. Mrs Higgs' commitment to the children, staff, and wider school community has been greatly appreciated, and she leaves behind a strong legacy. We are now beginning the process of recruiting a new Headteacher. During this transition period, the Governors are working closely with the local authority, Diocese and school leadership team to ensure continuity and stability for our pupils, staff, and families.

We have had lots of extra-curricular trips and sporting activities recently including a team of Year 3 & 4 pupils going to a Tri-Golf Championship and Owls Class having a trip on a barge on the Kennet & Avon Canal as part of their local studies, including a guided history trail around the Wharf to discover some of our local historical buildings.

Year 5 were lucky enough to visit The Base in Greenham for a tour around their new art exhibit, INSIGHT. They spent time with one of their resident artists, looking at the different artistic skills on display. After the tour, they were invited upstairs in The Base to see some of the artists' studios. The children found their visit very inspiring and particularly enjoyed chatting with the artists themselves!

Congratulations to Keyser House Group who won the annual Aldermaston House Group Cross Country Championships. Forster were hot on their heels and every House Group scored very well! This event is a real highlight of the school calendar. We close the vehicle gates to allow the children to run laps around the field and our school building. It is the only time we encourage children to run in a car park! The event took place in beautiful sunshine and there was so much encouragement and friendship between the children clearly on display throughout each race. Every child ran in an age grouped race and the first ten children to finish scored points for their house groups. For our Wrens Class, this was their first whole school running event and many of them smiled for the full lap! The Robins Class completed two laps, Owls Class completed four laps and Kingfishers and Starlings Class needed even more stamina to finish their six-lap race. Every child demonstrated our termly value of perseverance as they completed their laps. We had a lot of fun! Many thanks to our Year 6 helpers who supported in setting up and marshalling this event.

It was a privilege to watch our Year 6 children complete their KS2 SATs. They showed such maturity and composure over the four days of assessments and should feel incredibly proud of their efforts. # Aldermaston Parish Council – 13th May 2025

We voted Sophie Crawford as Chairman and Rob Smith as Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council, unopposed, testament to their leadership skills during the past year.

In open forum we discussed the Strawberry Field developments, in particular the burning of waste, leading to toxic fumes, which was affecting the residents of Kestrel Mead/Falcon Fields. We recommended that they approach Dominic Boeck, the Ward Councillor. We also discussed the resurfacing of the A340 outside the Parish Hall. One member of the public said he "would do his own thing". We also discussed the future of the Easy Concrete site on Paices Hill and were told that the application has gone to appeal. Timeframes were fluid.

We approved the policies and procedures associated with our business.

On the planning front, we were faced with three applications associated with conditions attached to previous planning applications and we remained silent on them all.

Since our last meeting, WBC has made five planning decisions affecting us. They have approved the application for the detached bungalow at Strawberry Farm and also the replacement windows at Barn End on Paices Hill. They have refused applications by Church Lodge and Middle Lodge, Church Road. They said that Compound B at Young's Industrial Estate, Paices Hill is deemed lawful for the conversion of B8 storage and distribution use.

Re the Hind's Head request for fixing of a small banner onto APC's side of the fence at the recreation ground, we agreed to fix a notice to their gate identifying it as providing public access to the Hind's Head. We also suggested the provision of an A-frame blackboard on the rec near the gate, which we felt would be more in keeping with our conservation area village setting.

Councillors Faulkner and Smith raised objections to the heavy traffic on Raghill, particularly coming from Padworth Sawmills.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> June 2025 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!

# Hello to you from Greyfield Wood!

What great weather we have been having. By the time you read this we will have enjoyed another Open day at the wood, where visitors will have been able to have guided tours of the wood and discuss various aspects of the work being done. Many thanks to all who attended and to the team of helpers who set up the visitor area and those who made and served tea and cake!



Our main news is that after nearly 8 months of delay, due to wet weather, we have begun the Contract felling. This is to remove diseased Ash trees, initially along the bridle way and public footpaths. This is a legal requirement upon the CIC directors to ensure that public rights of way in the wood are safe. Richard Edwards and his team from The Englefield Estate are doing a great job felling and doing the initial clear-up. Our various volunteer groups will now focus on final clearing and preparation for planting later in the year. For those of you who walk the wood regularly, please bear with us as on some days certain paths may be closed, or your walk is interrupted, whilst a specific tree near a footpath is being felled. YOUR safety is our priority!


Many of the mature Norwegian Spruce trees, most of them along the Douai Abbey side of the wood will also been felled and replaced with broadleaf saplings.

The task of clearing and preparing for replanting is a huge one, with around 400 saplings to be planted over the next two years! Hence our continuous appeals for volunteers to assist us. #### **BRIMPTON WI NEWS**

Our April Speaker was a guide for St. Georges Chapel in Windsor Castle. Her slide talk took the form of a stroll around these world famous buildings, without the crowds and no aching feet at the end of it!

Ann Hughes started her career as a guide at Clivedon and Dorney Wood. She decided to apply for a role at Windsor and over a year later was interviewed and joined the team at the Castle.

The history starts with William 1 and over the centuries, various Monarchs have added, demolished, altered, and changed the use of buildings and courtyards. Initially it was built for strategic reasons, on a bluff overlooking the river by William 1, to control the Thames, as a stronghold in case of attack. Henry 1 created the area known as the Lower Ward, Henry II strengthened the protective walls, Edward III greatly increased its size when he added the Upper Bailey. The Chapel became the base for the Knights Order of the Garter, which the Tudor Kings later embellished with its magnificent fan vaulted ceiling which took over 50 years to complete. The buildings and site really form a Tally Roll of the English Monarchy. In the 18<sup>th</sup> century George III undertook a major refurbishment of the castle in the form we now see.

Windsor is a royal palace and is used for State occasions, but at the same time it's a favoured country home of the Royal family. St George's Chapel is an active place of worship, many visitors timing their visit to hear Choral Evensong. Over the centuries many monarchs and their spouses as well as other family members have been buried there including of course our late Queen. Visitors

# **Brimpton Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 6<sup>st</sup> May. This was our Annual Meeting and agenda included:

The election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman. I was re-elected as Chairman and Nick Matthews was re-elected as Vice-Chairman.

Appointment of representatives to other organisations. These included John Dolphin to the Village Hall Management Committee; Phil Bassil to the AWE Local Liaison Committee; and Grahame Hawker to the WBC Climate Forum. We did not have a nomination to the Almshouses Charity. As the trustees of the Brimpton Common Fuel Allotment Charity are appointed for four years there was no need to confirm them as our representatives.

We agreed the Annual Governance & Accountability Statement.

We approved the Statement of Accounts and Asset Register for 2024/25

We discussed the Auditor's report on financial activity 2024/25 which was positive and made no recommendations for changes to procedures. .

We agreed the dates when electors may examine the Parish Council's financial records. Details of how to do so will be on our website.

We considered a retrospective planning application received from Basingstoke & Deane BC relating to new fences on land in Hockford Lane, Brimpton Common. Details available on B&D Council website ref. 25/00767/OOD and 25/00799 RET. We decided we had no view on this and would therefore not comment.

West Berkshire Council have informed us of an enquiry from the owners of Hillcourt Lodge, Brimpton Road, as to whether a full planning application was necessary or whether their proposal to extend the house could be accepted under permitted development. As this appears to be quite a large extension we would like to see a full planning application but we understand the rules on permitted development may allow the development to proceed without it.

We were updated about the arrangements for the VE Day event to be held on  $8^{th}$  May. The Brimpton beacon will be lit at 9.30pm.

champagne with a small group of neighbours who had gathered to cheer her home. Several local residents and business associates sponsored Heather and she raised, to-date, in excess of £600 for the Breast Cancer charity. Although the walk has finished, it is not too late to donate to her efforts for the charity if you are encouraged by her. Well done Heather!!

#### WAR - Evacuees, School Dinners, etc.

The Nation celebrated Victory in Europe VE Day on 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945.

On 1<sup>st</sup> September 1939 it was announced "instructions have been sent to local authorities to set up ARP Emergency Committees and local ARP controllers to assume duty (ARP – Air Raid Precautions). Work on public shelters to be accelerated and local authorities given power to requisition premises for civil defence purposes and for public shelters. Evacuation of children, expectant mothers, blind persons and cripples from certain congested areas including Greater London and Manchester will begin today. Some 3,000,000 people are affected, about a half of whom are children".

At 11am on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 1939 Britain declared war on Germany and 60.000 civilians would be killed before the end of hostilities. On 3<sup>rd</sup> September Don Attwood of Woolhampton had the following thoughts "That Sunday afternoon most of the village seemed to be standing around on the side of the Bath Road. Whether they just wanted reassurance from one another or whether they were waiting for arrivals from London to appear".

In April NRDC was informed that 3,300 evacuees could be accommodated in the Newbury district and the first 800 were to arrive by train over a period of 4 days.

However, the first evacuees to arrive in Woolhampton were staff and pupils of Elstree School, Hertfordshire, and 74 boys arrived on 18<sup>th</sup> September. Other evacuees were welcomed at Sun Hill, the 'Limes', at the 'Fancy Shop' (now 'Bow Cottage'), 'Tudor Cottage' and 'Woolhampton Court'. Some relationships so formed continued into the post-war years.

On 19<sup>th</sup> June 1940 official evacuees from Dagenham were admitted to Woolhampton village school and on 12<sup>th</sup> October 12 boys admitted from Pollard Hill School, Mitcham, Surrey. The roll on 22<sup>nd</sup> November showed 65 Berkshire children and 46 evacuees. The latter would seem to have departed before the end of 1942.

At this time school meals were brought from a depot established at the old 'Blue Coat School', Thatcham, later from 1944 at a site in 'Crown Court', Thatcham, serving meals to 2,000 children employing 28 staff. Pupils also enjoyed regular gas mask inspections from Air Raid Warden, Mr Walton. The school was also designated as a 'Rest Centre' and older girl pupils regularly 'turned the mattresses'.




