HELPING LOCAL PEOPLE IN CRISIS

West Berks Foodbank relies on your goodwill and support.

DID YOU KNOW - The Foodbank accepts fresh fruit and vegetables directly to their warehouse weekday mornings 9am-12pm

It's great to be able to share a good news story about the Foodbank Hungry Holidays initiative with our readers.

The scheme provided food and essential items during the school holidays to 1,152 children from 474 households across 47 schools. The detailed planning and organisation which started in March, the financial support from West Berkshire Council and Greenham Trust, corporate volunteers who offered their help and an army of willing volunteers resulted in the deliveries all being completed a week ahead of schedule. Fantastic!

However, there's always another side to the story. The donations this year from March to July totalled 34,056kgs compared to 39,863kgs in 2024, so more stock had to be purchased – 19,640kgs compared to 15,112kgs in 2024. Financial support is crucial for this. In June and July, the weight of purchased stock was almost equal to the weight of donations. It's not surprising that the result is that the stock level in the warehouse has fallen to approx. 20,000kgs despite almost



Organ Recital at St Matthew's Midgham by Roger Judd on Friday 18th July 2025

Roger Judd, who first gave a recital In Midgham in October 2022, returned in July to give a wonderful recital to around 30 people. Roger's parents had lived in Brimpton when he was a young man and he had practised on the Midgham organ before eventually becoming organist at St George's Chapel, Windsor.

Roger's programme included pieces by Sweelinck, Byrd, Bach, Wesley and Elgar (from his Vesper Voluntaries) though he did not present them in that order, preferring to move back and forth in time so as to bring out the contrasts in different music periods. One piece, Serenade (Opus 22) by Derek Bourgeois who died in 2017 was written in 11/8 time, graduating to 13/8 by the third page. That sounds complicated but the piece was de-



lightfully easy to listen to. Roger set the context for each piece and gave a short description of it. He ended with the Toccata in G by Theodore Dubois, a favourite in the organ repertory. It was a joy to listen to these pieces played with such ease and fluency, and to hear the variety of sound offered by the Midgham organ.

As is traditional at Midgham, there were delicious home-made refreshments to follow and our thanks go to those who prepared them.

Our next recital is on 19th September at 6 pm by Gill Blythman. Proceeds will go towards the restoration of the Gray and Davison organ in Thatcham Church, where Gill is now organist, which urgently needs restoration. Please look out for flyers and promote it in your community.

Defibrillators in Woolhampton

With the reinstatement of the defibrillator at the Village Hall, the Woolhampton area now has five defibrillators that are accessible 24/7. Others can be found at the front of the Angel Pub on the left-hand side on what used to be the Post Office and on the front of 6 Angel Mead on Station Road. Upper Woolhampton is served with two defibrillators, one in Abbey Gardens at the far end of the wheelie-bin enclosure near the entrance, and one on the machinery shed on Douai sports field near the Cods Hill entrance.

In the case of an incident, first dial 999 and explain the situation. You will be directed to the nearest defibrillator. For both defibrillators in Upper Woolhampton and the one in Angel Mead, you will need a code to open the cabinet. For the defibrillators at the Village Hall and the Angel, you simply pull the cabinet open and remove the defibrillator and preparation kit. This will set off an alarm that can be stopped by reclosing the cabinet.

You will receive clear recorded instructions on how to use the defibrillator when you open it up so that you can use it to restart the heart before the paramedics arrive. After use, contact the person responsible for maintenance of the defibrillator and return it to its cabinet.

Of course, we all hope we will never find ourselves in the situation where we need to use a defibrillator, but it is good to know that they are available if needed.

Annual Village Show 2025

One Village – Two Halls



In January 1929 Newbury Rural District Council considered a planning application for a village hall at Woolhampton from Mrs Whidborne of 'Kennet Orley'. This was intended primarily for the use of the Conservative Association and the British Legion. The NWN reported, "It appears that such functions as dances and whist drives are prohibited at the Gill Campbell Hall and it is proposed to let the new building provide this need." The Gill Campbell Hall had been provided in 1895 for the village as a centre for Christian activity, by Charlotte Blyth, the third daughter of the late James Blyth, a previous owner of the Woolhampton and Brimpton estate.

The plans were approved and the opening of the hall in 1929 was marked by a ceremony, organised by Mrs Whidborne, of old needlework and associated items of interest which included a miniature pack of cards crafted by French prisoners held in Porchester Castle during the Napoleonic Wars. The hall was named King George V Hall in thanksgiving for his recovery from a near fatal illness – septicaemia. (The King convalesced at Bognor and while in residence decreed that henceforth the town should be known as 'Bognor Regis'.) Villagers continued to enjoy the use of both halls - maybe the schoolchildren failed to 'enjoy' the sessions with the school dentist which were held in the Gill Campbell Hall!

The new hall, known as 'the hut', was purchased for the village in July 1945 by the generosity of the families of Mrs Whidborne and James Blyth-Currie, having been requisitioned during the war years and occupied by the Ministry of Labour. It was found that the George V 'hut' had been built on land owned by the de Grouchy family of Jersey, related by marriage to the Frankum family, and needed to be purchased by Woolhampton parish council.

In later years an unauthorised building appeared close to the King George – the very popular 'snooker hut'.

The Gill Campbell Hall is now a private residence and the old George V Hall was replaced by the present village hall built close to the site of the old 'hut', officially opened on $21^{\rm st}$ October 2006 by Richard Benyon MP. The building was partially financed by the small housing development sited on land close to the old George V Hall .

Aldermaston Parish Council - 12th August 2025

There was no open forum, which meant that more time could be spent on important planning recommendations. We had six applications to review, two of which we had seen before.

We agreed no objection to the various tree works at The Red House, The Street, nor to the resubmitted plans for the conversion of 1-2 Dixons Cottages into a single dwelling in Church Road. The three remaining applications proved more controversial. We will object to retrospective plans for the converting of Corbyn in Soke Road into in effect offices for Neals, the packaging company, as we feel their application is disingenuous, and doesn't reflect the true status of the residential building. Despite the Parish Clerk having received a letter from the land agent, we will object to Unit A at Young's industrial estate, due to the DPZ. This was the subject of our judicial review. We will not object to the application for the conversion of the redundant farm building in Fisherman's Lane, although we will insist on the same conditions as last time.

Since the last meeting, West Berks have made seven decisions on planning applications. They will not object to the tree works at Brook House The Pottery, and 33 The Street. They have decided planning permission for the demolition of an outbuilding at Burnt Pine, Reading Road, is not required. They have approved the erection of a replacement building at Cedar Lodge, Soke Road, but unfortunately they have refused the application for a garden/summer house at 26 Maida's Way. They granted approval of the non-material amendment to the application for the industrial estate at Blacks Lake.

We decided not to change the "kissing gate" at the recreation ground although signs for disabled access in the pub car park will be requested.

WBC have decided to move the railings outside the school slightly. This will be done during the October half-term.

Vegetation has been cut down on the pavement near the Church at our request.

We decided to join the proposed cross-border Liaison Committee, at the request of Baughurst Parish Council.

In her report, the Parish Clerk gave an update on the hours spent on budget reporting, which she hopes will reduce as she becomes more familiar with the process.

In his report, Dominic Boeck, our Ward member, commented on the members' bid process, which could raise £5,000 for the local community.

The Chairman expressed admiration for the long service of Councillor Alison Faulkner, who was attending the meeting for the last time because she is moving to pastures new.

There was a request for CIL funding, being the purchase of a Tithe Map by the Aldermaston History Group.

Under AOB, Wray's Farm, Raghill, was mentioned.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 9th September 2025 at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed! For full information on Parish Council matters, please visit our website at www.aldermaston.co.uk

NATURE NOTES

All those that are interested know that the diet of the cinnabar moth caterpillar (those football striped orange and dark brown ones) consists of ragwort. I hadn't the heart to starve them by weeding them (the groundsels) all out, so I had to leave them until eventually they all disappeared, leaving the tatty remains of the groundsel. I removed it of course but still wondered why they were there. The mystery was solved when, idly browsing through my wild flower book, I came across this; 'At first glance groundsels and ragworts appear very different, but they belong to the same genus, united by botanical details of the flowers.' Problem solved! You learn something every day.



Notes From Beenham Parish Council meeting - Monday 4th August

Public Forum

Progress on a 20 mph speed limit being introduced adjacent to the school? WBC are studying the impact of the Theale 20mph scheme and hope to form a policy

Eastbound Slip road junction of Bath Road and Beenham. WBC have advised that they consider that the Eastbound slip road scheme "to be the most suitable arrangement given the existing highway conditions. For the purposes of clarity, southbound road users travelling from Beenham Hill and wishing to join the A4 Bath Road heading eastwards are required to give way to eastbound road users already on the A4 Bath Road, as indicated by the existing road markings and traffic signs at this location."

Councillor Responsibilities

Redistribution of responsibilities. Police Liaison-Alex Cother; PC representative on Victory Hall Committee-Peter Hamblin; Roads and Footpaths-a parishioner volunteered to take on this role on behalf of and reporting to the PC.

Councillors

School bus drop off point in Stoneyfield has reverted back to its original location.

Aldermaston Wharf parking. It was explained that WBC is putting together a Parking Planning scheme, which will include Mallard Way.

Planning Matters

- 25/01497/HOUSE: 5 Back Lane, Beenham. Single storey/side and rear extensions. No objection.
- -24/02808/FULMAJ. Grundon. Application has been granted. Grundon have asked the PC why they asked to see a master plan for the development of this site. As there have been several separate applications for small developments on this site, the PC was concerned about 'creeping development' on a site that encroaches upon the AONB.

Councillor reports

It was agreed to discuss a Climate Action Plan at the next meeting

Parking on pavements/footpaths adjacent to the school/Picklepythe Lane. This has been raised by the VH Committee as being dangerous for the disabled, motobility scooter users, parents with child buggies etc as access is being blocked. This has also been an issue in Back Lane. The PC will extend the request not to park in this way to the area near the school.

Repairs/Maintenance of playground and equipment. Work to be carried out by AES.

BEENHAM ALLOTMENTS

Like everyone the allotments have suffered from the heatwaves, luckily the slugs have also suffered so slug damage is less.

Everyone is trying to pick fruit and veg which they have lovingly nurtured and oddly enough the courgettes / marrows seem to be doing well, so I thought I'd share another recipe with you if you're wondering what to do with the courgettes people are kindly leaving out in Beenham.

Ingredients for Chilli Jam:

- · 4 medium sized courgettes, grated
- . 1 tin tomatoes (or equivalent in the real thing) chopped
- 1lb 10 oz sugar
- · 9 fl oz red wine vinegar
- thumb sized lump of ginger, grated
- · bulb of garlic, minced
- several fresh chillis chopped finely, or dried chillies chopped (to taste I use about 8)

Method for Chilli Jam:

- 1. Put everything in the pan together and boil for about an hour or until the mixture looks thickish.
- It doesn't have to set like jam and it doesn't have to be as thick as conventional chutney, but it shouldn't have too much loose liquid.
- Put into sterilised jars.
- Can be eaten immediately.

This recipe can be adapted to use up gluts. I have made it with red peppers, celery and even rhubarb! The courgette one is our favourite.

Greyfield Wood – September 2025



Hello to you from Greyfield Wood!

It has been another busy time in the Wood.

The last of the felled timber has now been extracted for processing and the felled areas now need to be cleared of remaining wood debris, ready for planting in November / December.

So, there continues to be plenty of work for our volunteer groups over the next few months, with the clearing of wood debris, keeping the brambles at bay, ensuring that drainage ditches are clear for when the rain returns, etc. But by the end of the year we expect to have started planting the new saplings and new life will return to the wood.

We still have a good supply of "cordwood" for sale. Our cordwood is sold in measures of 2 cubic metres, and the logs are one metre in length. Buyers will need to collect and transport the wood and also cut it to suit their fires. We do not provide dried fire -ready logs. Please let me know if you would like to know more.

If you would like to join our group of volunteers please contact me. You are not expected to be there every week, just come when you are able. Every small activity in the wood helps.

Let's hope for some rain soon!

Environment

The Queen's Memorial of Stone has been installed at the War Memorial. Mr Hicks thanked Mr Bassil for his work on the project. Mr Bassil thanked Mr Brims for presiding over the ceremony and Mr Matthews for his help with installing the stone.

Baughurst Parish Council and Tadley Town Council have proposed setting up a liaison committee between the local authorities in the area. It was agreed that Brimpton Parish Council should send a representative. Mrs Matthews agreed to attend. Clerk to accept the invitation and inform Baughurst Parish Council that Mrs Matthews will attend.

Planning

25/01523/HOUSE - The Croft, Wasing Road Proposed new driveway access and garage

The Parish Council resolved to object to the second driveway access as it is unnecessary and questions the need for a modest bungalow to have a three-bay garage in addition to the existing integral garage. If West Berkshire Council is minded to grant permission for this garage, it should be subject to a condition (similar to Tarkwa in 2008) that it must never be separated from The Croft and must never be developed into a separate dwelling.

25/01522/HOUSE – 26 Brimpton Common. single-storey, side and rear extension and a two-storey rear extension to the property to provide an extended kitchen/dining and living area and a utility/WC at ground floor level and an enlarged bedroom to the first floor.

The Parish Council resolved to respond with no objections.

25/01732/OOD – Out of district. 25/01735/RET – Land off Hockford Lane - Timber five bar gate and area of hardstanding for access to agricultural land

The Parish Council resolved not to comment on this application.

Brimpton Common planning enforcement update

Mr Hicks contacted West Berkshire's Planning Enforcement to ask why no further action had been taken to enforce the stop notices that were served regarding the new entrances that were installed without permission. They confirmed that there have been 11 notices served but they cannot take action as it is not an 'engineering operation'. A resident has been told that all the cases were being reviewed but no further update has been given.

The Parish Council will meet again on Tuesday 2nd September, starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All are welcome to attend and residents may raise issues in the Open Forum that are not otherwise listed on the agenda. Evelyn Ruth Weston 13 April 1936 - 23 July 2025

Evelyn was born in Quidenham, Norfolk. The family moved to Berkshire when she was a few weeks old where she lived for the rest of her life, apart from a short time in Somerset in the late 1960s. She was the eldest of four sisters. Her father was a Methodist Local Preacher.

Her first job was at Welsteads Department Store in Reading, later worked at Cold Ash Children's Hospital and then for a family in Highclere as a live-in nanny. She married Ken in 1963 but was sadly widowed in 2004. She loved her pet dogs and cats.

Many people benefitted from Evelyn's generosity. She sponsored a single mum, Kumba Bah, to go through teacher training in The Gambia. After qualifying Kumba worked her way to become a Headmistress. This has helped Kumba to support her aging parents. Evelyn also sponsored two Gambian girls through their education and bought them bicycles for their long journey to school. She paid for a well to enable the women to water



their vegetable plots, play equipment in a school and a toilet in another school. She also sponsored the education of two girls in Vietnam.

Evelyn was a devout Christian. Her faith meant a great deal to her. Holy Week was a special time in the church calendar for Evelyn. She found the prayerful and reflective atmosphere uplifting and spiritually fulfilling. She was very fond of children and loved helping at Messy Church. It was a delight to see her surrounded by children, chatting away to them, helping with their crafts — and enjoying having a go herself.

Evelyn was a loyal member of the PCC for 14 years. Although her mobility prevented her from doing more physical tasks, she was generous in many other ways. When we held a church spring clean, she would come and polish the brass or do sewing repairs.

She was a sociable lady and was always well-dressed, with a pretty brooch on her lapel, whether going to lunch clubs in Tadley or Woolhampton, or enjoying tea at Midgham Café or a visit to a garden centre. She enjoyed gardening and buying plants.

She attended the local WI and appreciated listening to the speakers and chatting with other members during the break.

Evelyn will be sadly missed by all who knew her.
