Woolhampton News

Woolhampton & Midgham WI

Hello Everyone and Happy November! It will certainly be November when you are reading this. Dark days, long nights, fireworks and hopefully a bit of frost to replenish the gardens.

It is two months since I sent in news of our goings on at the WI. We have had two very interesting speakers. The first in September was the lovely Ailsa Claybourn from the Thatcham Nature Discovery Centre who came to talk about butterflies. Ailsa really gave us a delightful evening as she showed slides of the most beautiful specimens and told us where to find them. We learned the difference between the moth and the butterfly – not always easy to tell. We were surprised to learn that there are two and a half thousand species of moth – but only 69 species of butterfly in the British Isles. Sadly, it has not been a good year for butterflies. Ailsa told us that the floods we had over the winter and into the spring had decimated the number of butterflies which were lying dormant in their cocoons and sadly millions died. We hope the winter is kinder this year and numbers begin to recover.

Our speaker in October was Stuart Flitton, a journalist for over 30 years. He started his career in the early 70's in Johannesburg during the very strict apartheid regime writing 'News In Brief' – snippets of news no more that 50 words in length. He came up through reporting in the courts, Motoring reports, and then as a press reporter at demonstrations in South Africa. His time in Africa gave him many enviable memories – he attended the Queen concert in South Africa and ended up with Freddie Mercury sleeping in the back of his car.

His many narrow escapes as the demonstrations against apartheid became more violent and indiscriminate police brutality more dangerous led him to return to the UK where he soon climbed the ladder. Back in the UK, he luckily met an old friend who was working on The Times newspaper at a senior level, who gave him the break into the Broadsheets.

Next came the transition from the early printing presses through to the present digital age and the turmoil in the printing industry that it brought about. It was a very interesting talk which gave us a good insight into the many facets of working to deadlines on a newspaper.

We have a visit to the Needlework Exhibition at The Base, Greenham Common coming up this month. We are planning a Christmas meal out – probably at a garden centre restaurant in early December, so already our thoughts are turning towards Christmas and plans are afoot for our Christmas Party and other Festive activities.

If you like the sound of our WI group and would like to pay us a visit, we meet every month on the second Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm. You would be very welcome to come to any meeting as a guest.

Warners - the Staff of Life & Writing on the Wall

In 1875 George Warner came from Reading and established his Woolhampton bakery in the present 'Old Bakery', Bath Road. Bread, the staple diet of the majority in these Victorian years,

consumed at a rate of one 1/2 lb per person daily (more than a quarter of a 4lb large loaf providing 40% of total calories). There were strict regulations regarding the sale of this staple. Bakers were obliged to have scales in their shops and on the delivery cart – a large loaf was 4lb - and their wares might be stopped to be weighed while on the road or awaiting sale in their shops.



George also catered for village events and provided pancakes for Douai on Shrove Tuesday when the whole family (there were eight children) were busy from dawn with the red crock frying pan. He was a leading member of the village Congregational chapel, a crack shot, and a member of the local Yeomanry. He was assisted in the bakery by eldest son Horace (aka Tommy) who was later employed in the bakery at Douai and his own business as jobs master – a horse drawn taxi service. During the 1914-18 war he served as a field baker. During his absence, father George died and younger brother Frank, landlord at the 'Rising Sun' took over his father's business. Blacksmith Albert Shuttle had built a shop at the foot of Woolhampton Hill for daughters Annie and Lizzie. They were pleased to relinquish the business and allow Horace to install his ovens, open a business, the 'Broadway Bakery', and display his name on the side of the present 'Willows', Bath Road - still visible today.

Prior to establishing the 'Broadway Bakery', Horace and wife spent their early married life in the present 'Old Post House' that had, in previous years, housed the village infant school at which Horace had been a pupil.

During the 1930s, Horace's younger brother Montague had built a bakery on the site of the present 'Bakewell House', Bath Road. He later moved to farming and the bakery was bought by nephew Tommy who expanded the business and in the 1960s it held a mini market. Tommy died in 1963 and the family business closed in 1975 – 100 years after George Warner had opened at the 'Old Bakery', Bath Road.

There is also writing on the wall of 'Bakewell House' - 'Old Woolhampton Bakery established 1875.' - correct but not on this site.

This is but part of the story of the Warners in Woolhampton.



ALDERMASTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

We sent two teams of KS1 children to take part in our local Multiskills Festival at Theale Green School to test their skills against teams from several other local primary schools. The children took part in a lovely range of activities including speed stacking, boccia, golf skills and archery, to score points for their team. Many thanks to our teachers for organising our participation and for accompanying the children and to the parents and friends who came along to encourage the children and cheer loudly. The children looked so smart in their school sports kit, and everyone was very impressed with the support they gave their teammates and their exemplary behaviour.

Our Family Learning Morning was a great success with more than 70 parents and carers coming into school to join in with music lessons. These sessions are designed for parents to learn alongside their child/ren and are encouraged to get fully involved, rather than just watching and the pupils love sharing their learning and showing what they can achieve. Each term we look at a different aspect of the curriculum for these special sessions. The music topic allowed us to show how music lessons are taught across the different classes and ages and how technology is being used to enhance the learning and skills of the children.

The PTA is busy organising a Glow & Glitter Disco which should be great fun, and we hope to see plenty of moves on the dance floor. The PTA team works hard to raise valuable money to support the school and this year so far over £3400 has been given to school, including £1000 towards remedial work on the outdoor play equipment. Future planned activities include a movie night, a Valentines disco and a Colour Run in the spring.

Aldermaston Parish Council –8th October 2024

In Open Forum, we were faced by local residents who objected strongly to plans for significant expansion at Aldermaston Recycling on Paice's Hill. Volume of traffic, noise and dust pollution were among the reasons given for their objection (see also below).

On the planning front, this month we had three applications, two of which were classed (by WBC!) as major. Dealing with our only non-major application, we decided not to object to Burnt Pine, Reading Road. Essentially the owners want to demolish an existing outbuilding and replace it with a garden room to the rear of the property.

Consistent with our policy of not wishing to see any increase in HGV traffic on the existing A340, we will object to both major applications. We don't see the 7-fold expansion of Aldermaston Recycling (please see above) as feasible given their current footprint. We will also oppose the variation in conditions for the proposed new industrial estate at Black's Lake, also on Paice's Hill, as the current proposal bears little resemblance to the existing proposal that was granted outline approval 4 years ago. With regard the latter, we will also write to WBC to ascertain precisely what the granting of outline planning means.

Speaking of WBC, we were disappointed to learn of their Chief Executive, Nigel Lynn is standing down after just 3 years in post. We had great expectations of him, especially as he had been out to see us and discuss our long-term problems.

Success! The overhanging vegetation on the footpath to the Church has been cleared although how much of this is due to Triangle and how much is due to Praxis is debateable. We were advised that the gate between the Church and the car park was locked. This could cause problems for the wedding goers who are expected this weekend.

The allotments have been broken in. As well as entering several locked sheds, some vegetables have been stolen. The local police have agreed to help, but please be vigilant, especially with reporting unusual incidents. And talking of anti-social behaviour, the local rector has reported that even the Church graveyard has been targeted!

As you have probably read elsewhere, WBC are currently running a consultation on waste recycling. Amongst their proposals is the suggestion to reduce the frequency of black bin collection from fortnightly to once every three weeks. They claim such a move would be cost neutral and not lead to increases in such scourges as littering and fly tipping. If you disagree, you know what to do, noting that the deadline for comments is 6th November!

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 12th November at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall. As usual, your presence is welcomed!



Radish Leaf soup;

- · 50g butter plus a good splash of olive oil
- · 2 onions, peeled and chopped
- · 6 garlic cloves, peeled and roughly chopped (I like garlic, reduce or leave out if you don't)
- 1 tbsp dried mixed herbs
- 500g of peeled, diced potatoes (more for a more filling soup)
- 500ml water
- 1ltr vegetable or light chicken stock
- Salt and ground black pepper to taste.
- · Radish leaves when prepared enough to fill a two litre jug or more if available.

Method to Prepare Radish leaf Soup

- Melt the butter and oil in the base of a large pan. Add the chopped onion and garlic and cook for a couple of minutes, stirring frequently until the onion is softened and translucent.
- Add the cubed potatoes and dried herbs to the pan. Stir for a minute and then add the water. Bring to the boil then lower the heat, cover, and simmer for about 10-15 minutes, until the potatoes are tender.
- Whilst the potatoes are cooking, prepare the radish leaves by cutting off stalks below the leaves and washing thoroughly in cold water.
- Check potatoes and if softened add the radish leaves and the stock. Stir and bring to a boil again. Lower the heat and simmer with the lid on for 5 minutes. The leaves should be completely wilted.
- Use a stick blender in the pan until the soup is smooth. Add salt and ground black pepper to taste.
- Optionally when serving stir in a couple of good dessert spoonfuls of Greek yogurt. If batch cooking for freezing, do not add yogurt which may separate when thawed and reheated.

This made enough for 10 good servings. It freezes well and keeps for at least a year at -18°C Just reduce amounts if you want to make less.

Brimpton Parish Council

The Parish Council met at the Village Hall on **Tuesday 1st October**. Among the items discussed were:

Joanne Watson, the Chair of the Brimpton Common Residents' Group, reported on recent developments at Blacknest Lane field.

Plot E – West Berkshire Council has served the owner with a planning enforcement notice related to the work already carried out.

Plot F – The planning application for a house has been refused by West Berkshire Council.

Plot H – The planning application was refused. The applicant has until 22nd November to appeal against this decision.

Twin Paddocks – the owner has appealed against the enforcement notice served on them by West Berkshire Council. There are now two appeals related to this site. A case management conference is scheduled for 20th October and the public hearing has been scheduled for January 2025.

We discussed the new planning application for Plot E in the Blacknest Lane field, which seeks a change of use of the land to equestrian and the formation of an access bridge to Brimpton Lane. We decided to object to the application as the site is not considered large enough for a horse, there is no plan for a stable and there is no indication as to how water would be provided on the site. In addition, the application seeks permission to build an entrance from Brimpton Lane using a railway sleeper bridge. The entrance has already been created using hardcore.

We noted that planning approval has been granted for alterations to Shalford Farm House and to Brimpton House. We had supported both of these applications.

The planning application for the demolition of the Traveller's Friend pub and the building of 18 flats had been recommended for approval but awaits further information on drainage.

The application to Basingstoke & Deane Council for a change of use to car sales at the site of The Pineapple (more recently La Capanna) in Brimpton Common, which was to have been considered by the B&D Planning Committee in September, appears not yet to have been decided. This may be because there is a problem with the application, or the Committee had too many items to discuss.

The Parochial Church Council requested £3,500 for repairs and maintenance to the footpath around St Peter's Church. We agreed to the application which will be paid from the Community Infrastructure Levy funds that we hold.

The Village Hall Management Committee submitted two grant requests, one for £840.30 to replace the security alarm and another for £4,132.08 to purchase new chairs. John Dolphin, Chairman of the Committee, explained that the Village Hall's reserves could not be used as they have been earmarked to deal with items raised in the recent condition survey. We agreed to both applications which will be paid from the Community Infrastructure Levy funds that we hold.

The Parish Council will meet again on **Tuesday 5th November**, starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All residents are welcome to attend the meeting.

BRIMPTON W

At September's meeting we took advantage of catching up during the social time.

Our talk was by local craftsman, Jason Leggett, entitled, "Working with Glass". Jason talked of several different vocations in his early working years. He was not happy or fulfilled in any of them. His life changing experience came after attending a series of short courses on aspects of working with glass.

Initially these formed a basis of a hobby. As his skill and knowledge in the craft increased, he decided to make it his career. It was a big step to take but being able to immerse himself in the craft he loved and earn a living, felt was the right thing to do.

In his studio in Mortimer he not only creates his own work but teaches others. A particular favourite he finds very rewarding is teaching Autistic children, some of whom he says are extraordinarily creative.

Most people know of the stained-glass windows which over the centuries has decorated many churches, public and private buildings in this country. Nowadays whilst glass artists are being commissioned to make new designs, there is a large demand for conservation, restoration and repair of glass windows dating back over 500 years.

This is very dirty work as the putty and lead crumbles during removal then mixes with the grime and soot on the old glass and gets everywhere. Wherever possible the original glass is cleaned and put back into the window. This is held in place by new leads. Colours are matched for correctness, and any broken or missing pieces are replaced. Some windows incorporate glass which has been painted with enamels to include detail of faces, hands, clothes etc. This requires greater artistic craftsmanship, as any new glass will need to be matched with the old.

Following the procedure used by the original craftsman, the outline of the design is sketched onto the background glass colour, and is checked against the adjacent pieces before the rest of the detail is painted in. This is then heated in a kiln to fuse the enamels onto the glass. Once cool the new pieces are placed into the design and the task of re-leading and soldering in place undertaken.

Another well-known area of glass artistry is blown glass. This is highly skilled and the way flat sheets of glass was first made. A cylindrical shape was blown then the molten glass was cut with shears. The cylinder opened and the glass uncurled itself on a flat surface. Flat sheets of glass can be painted with enamels, then piled up on top of one another, to create an image with depth and then fused together in a kiln. When looking along the edges, the number of sheets used to create the final piece can be counted.

Jason admitted that blown glass is the technique he enjoys doing most.

He gave us a fascinating talk and his enthusiasm for glass of all kinds was evident. After the meeting we had the opportunity to look at some pieces he had brought with him. These included those he uses for his beginner's workshops.

Our next meeting is at 7:30pm on Tuesday, 19 November in Brimpton Village Hall. Our speaker will be Sarah Cox who will talk on C.R.I.M.E. Tea, coffee and homemade cakes will be served after the speaker.
